Breaking News - Update to Rules for the Scale Competition

As indicated in the June Newsletter the Scale Competition will be returning at this year's Summer Gala, and yes we have managed to secure the scale trophy from the previous winner. Mike where did you say you'd put it again.....?

However, following much heated debate at the last committee meeting we are going for a slightly different set of rules for the competition. Not wishing to overlap too much with the Club's Concours event the emphasis for the scale competition will be on *Realistic Scale Flight*, and not just good looks. Voting however, like the Concours event, will be open to everyone in attendance.

The basic format will consist of all planes entering the Scale Competition to be on display in a designated area of the pits to allow everyone to have a look at the competitors. Then the competing pilots will have a maximum 5 minute flying slot to perform and demonstrate *Realistic Scale Flying* befitting of their aircraft. You may even get some commentary as well, our gracious chairman has promised me a megaphone and I won't be afraid to use it! Oh the power...

Ideally the scale competition will start at approximately 3.30pm so if you are interested in taking part please arrive giving yourself plenty of time to get your plane ready in between eating burgers and hot-dogs from the BBQ.

Again this is meant to be fun so remember the focus is on flying, this is not the Concours so come along and have a go. As the emphasis is on Scale Flying it will be the pilot of the winning plane that will be awarded the trophy (Mike where did you say you put it?) not the builder of the winning plane, although most likely these will be one and the same.

Although Scale is the key term it doesn't rule out helicopters, or modern aircraft such as Jets or Aerobatic planes and of course covers scratch builds through to ARTF kits. If you do have any specific question please get in contact with me at mrp_guy@yahoo.co.uk

Associated with this Newsletter is an Entry Form for the Scale Competition. You do not have to complete it before the event and blank copies will be available on the day, but completing it before you arrive and letting me have it early would help me to prepare a suitable commentary.

As also indicated in the June Newsletter there will be other events going on during the day such as the Aircraft Taxi Race and RC Car Grand Prix around the strip, a Fly-By from the Club's Winter Build 'Construction Cartel' showing off their hard work and maybe some other 'Fun-Fly' competitions. There will also be plenty of time for general flying and if your plane is fitted with lights we could go all night!

Overall the main aim is just to have some fun!

Chuckie Challenge - Club Meeting Sunday, August 21st from 16:00hrs at Towersey (Note, there is no Monday meeting in August.)

One of the greatest ever design challenges facing aeromodellers is the humble chuck glider. She needs to be strong and stable at high speed to withstand the launch yet light and stable to float back to mother earth at a minimum sink rate to extend the flight time. There is also the dilemma of how to trim a model to climb steeply at high speed without it looping back over and clattering the launcher on the back of the head, never mind trying to think through what on earth is happening with the aerodynamics as the model transitions from the launch speed to wafting speed. The



good news is that the August club meeting has been set up purely to put all theories to the test and, given that a team of monkeys can eventually write Shakespeare, I reckon that we, the proud and intellectual members of the High Wycombe and District Model Aircraft Club, can conquer the chuck glider!

Construction rules are that the model is to be made solely from a 1/8"x4"x18" balsa sheet (expected to be used for the wings, tailplane and fin) and a 1/4"x1/2"x18" balsa strip (expected to be used for the fuselage) which will be supplied to each entrant on the day. The entire model must be made on the day and solely from some or all of the supplied sheet and strip. Exactly how you use it is up to you, but that is all you get. The entrant chops up



and glues the wood back together and the shapes into which the lumber is chopped and glued back together is where the ingenuity lies. Lead flashing will be provided to assist in balancing the model, CA and kicker will be supplied to build and repair models as well as a token effort of modelling knives, abrasives and cutting mats - entrants are welcome (even encouraged) to bring and use their own tools. If you fancy making a practise model in the meantime then you will get change from £3 for enough wood to fashion two entire models at Slough's prices - who said aeromodelling is expensive??

The flying competition will be a series of head-to-head fly-offs. Depending on how many folk enter the competition there will be either a single league where all entrants fly against all other entrants or several leagues where entrants fly against every other entrant in their group.

Following the group/league stage the overall winner will be decided by a series of finals which, again depending how many entrants there are, will either be the top two going into a final or the top 4 or 8 going into semi or quarter finals. For the head-head fly-offs, the competitors will launch simultaneously when a whistle is blown (you'll be given a clue with a countdown from 3), any loitering after the whistle has blown will be penalised. In the group/league stages flying for 1 second or more than than your opponent will count as a win, if the gliders land within 1 second of each other then it will be considered a draw.

Materials etc. will be available and build can be started from 4:00pm, registration will close at 5:00pm (possibly a bit later but as it is dependent on the number of entrants I'll need a couple of minutes to organise the competition schedule) and competition flying will start at 6:00pm and should be all done and dusted by 7:30pm.


Towersey News

Regulars at the Towersey strip will be pleased to hear that the crop has been cut and will almost certainly have been be harvested by the time you read this. However, if the crop is still on the ground then please follow the existing track but if the crop has been harvested then please avoid using existing tracks. Last year the farmer was concerned at the loss of yield he suffered as a result of us driving to and from the strip, to anyone who has been down to the strip and seen the cut crop it is obvious that the yield is considerably less where we drive, park and turn around so when the crop is growing it is important to use existing tracks, car park spaces and turn around areas.

The August club night, which will be more of a late afternoon than a night, has been moved to Towersey. The theme of the evening is the Chuckie Challenge (see the article in this newsletter) and Towersey is perfectly suited to this meeting. Normal club flying will unlikely be interrupted as the meeting involves building and flying chuck gliders.

Over the past couple of months Gavin and myself have been looking at making better use of the square footage of the strip. In it's present layout we have 3 approaches which do not include an approach for the prevailing South-Westerly wind direction which would put the pitting area directly under an active flying area. The current layout also has the sometimes uncomfortable situation of having to drive under the active flying area to the West of the strip. The farmer is happy to consider changes to the strip so, following a couple of afternoons studying the BMFA recommendations, measuring the field and scratching out heads we have drawn up a cunning plan.

The proposed layout is a triangle shape which gives us a main North-South strip that is 52m long and two other strips (South West - North East and North West - South East) that are both 39m Long. The landing strips on the current layout are 25m long on the East - West approach, 35m long on the North - South approach and 42m long on the North West - South East approach. The new layout loses the East - West strip which at 25m is shortest on the current layout but replacing that will be the 39m long South West - North East approach and as it is inline with the prevailing wind it gives us a much better chance of taking-off and landing with a head wind.



From a safety point of view, the proposed layout has the car park and the pitting areas well inside the no-fly zone. The track to the pits and car park only has a length of 30m that is under the active flying area and that section of the track (by the gate to the field) is 145m away from the strip.

The proposed layout has been approved by the committee and is (at the time of writing) with the farmer for his approval. If we get approval then it is anticipated that the new layout will be in use by the end of August. Gavin will endeavour to get it up and running as soon as possible but the concern is that the ground will be very rough where we will be cutting into areas which have not been previously mowed and they may need a few weeks to settle.

Perfect Weather For the July Warbird Wednesday!!!

Yes, you read it correctly, for the first time this century the official Warbird Wednesday had light patchy cloud with a sweet little 3kt trickle of air straight down the strip and barely a hint of turbulence anywhere over field. Better than that, the weather brought out a whole host of fantastic aircraft including three WWII twin engine models and a stunning array of aircraft modelled on designs from 6 different countries. The evening started with a nice little show piece from Jon and his Stampe, fresh from flying several slots at the Wings & Wheels Model Spectacular the model looked even more majestic over the Flackwell fields. Daren maidened his He111, she looks sweet with her cockpit and turret details, flys superbly and the sound of the two 4-strokes turned the rest of us (camouflage?) green with envy. Sporting a brutal looking B-25 Mitchell was Emil, with a little assistance from Jon the B-25 was dominating the sky in a truly menacing fashion and giving us another fine spectacle. Twin engine veteran Graham brought along his trusty Hornet, with a few tweaks the model looked for all the world like she was ripping the very fabric of time and space! At the more sedate end Guy brought along his re-engine and re-balanced Fokker D.VIII, moving the CG really made the difference in the fly-ability of the model and what a difference a couple of extra horses in the power plant make, for my money she's just right now with enough pull to fly comfortably yet slow enough to let us appreciate the very sweet



lozenge colour scheme. Add to the flight line an SE5a, a couple of Nieuport 17's, an MC202 and a P51D, the pits were also an awesome sight.
